Laura Johnson, class of 2020 and 2021



Originally from Ashburn, Virginia, Laura earned three teaching degrees. As a member of the Cormier Honors College, she was a double major in modern languages, graduating with a bachelor's degree and a teaching license in both French and Teaching English as a Second Language. She also minored in Creative

Writing and in English. A year later, she completed a master's degree in Special Education. Laura is now middle-school French teacher.

Laura's study abroad experience took her to France twice. First, for her capstone general education course, she participated in a three-week summer course with Madame Edwards in the western port city of La Rochelle. In her junior year, she lived with a host mother for a semester in Grenoble in the French Alps, where she studied culture, civilization, mythology, and French literature.

On campus, Laura was a French tutor and an advisor in the Writing Center. With her faculty mentor, Dr. Edwards, she also participated in the student research program, CURIO, investigating the *Filles du roi*—women sent from France in the 17th century to help populate French-speaking Canada—and was selected as one of five college students statewide to receive the FLAVA award for future language educators.

Winner of a statewide award for future language educators from the Foreign Language Association of Virginia, Julie graduated with a degree in Teaching English as Second Language with minors in Spanish and International Studies. She then completed Longwood's one-year master's degree in Special Education and Teaching.

As an undergraduate, Julie served as a Spanish tutor in the Learning Center and also tutored student-

athletes in both Spanish and English. Back home in Roanoke in the summer, she taught English literacy to adult immigrants and refugees through Blue Ridge Literacy. She continued this work in Farmville in coordination with Dr. Gutiérrez at the Immigration Center.

As a junior, Julie was awarded the Draper/Barksdale Schollarship for Study Abroad and spent a semester in Valencia, Spain, where she studied Spanish civilzation and culture, Hispanic cinema, and Spanish literature.
